2025 New Bethel Black History Month Celebrations

Activities began at New Bethel on the first Sunday in February.

First Sunday: Ms. Ruby Cain shared that Carter G. Woodson is the Father of Black History Month in the United States. In February 1926, he launched the celebration of Negro History Week the precursor of Black History Month. Carter G. Woodson was a Historian, author, journalist and Dean of Howard University. He is the second African American, after W.E.B. Du Bois to earn a PHD from Harvard University. Woodson is the only person whose parents were enslaved in the United States to obtain a PhD in history.

2nd Sunday: New Bethel had its first "T Shirts on Super Bowl Sunday". Everyone was invited to wear their T Shirts or Sweatshirts representing their church, college or sports team. The group picture featured at least 20 people but we had at least 30 members participating.

Our own Triple A students: Aoki Boden, Aziah Shuford, and Avery Richardson presented Mazie Woodruff, Jocelyn Johnson and Vivian Burke for the youth presentation for Black History Month. Mrs. Carol Poe, the Chair of the Black History Committee, selected and provided the historical information for the students These three African American ladies were elected by the people and were committed to the public service of their communities and all of Winston-Salem.

Mazie Woodruff was the first African American Woman on the Forsyth County Board of Commissioners, which she served for 14 years. Jocelyn Johnson represented the East Ward for 4 terms and was a Social Worker at WFU Medical Center formerly called Baptist Hospital

Vivian Burke was the longest serving City Council Woman for 43 years and she was the first African American Mayor Pro Tempore and the first woman to head the Public Safety Committee.

3rd Sunday: Connie Smith presented on Mary McLeod Bethune, who was an educator, civil rights activist, humanitarian and the founder of the National Council of Negro Woment in the 20th century. She was the 15th of 17

children born to former slaves in Mayesville, SC. She attended Scotia Seminary which is now Barber Scotia College in Concord, NC and Moody Bible Institute in Chicago. She founded Bethune Cookman University and was an advisor to five Presidents. A statue was erected in her honor in 1974. It was the first monument to honor an African American and a woman in a public park in the nation's capital. It is located in Lincoln Park in Washington, DC.

4th Sunday Connie Marks presented "The Current State of Politics." She wore a t-shirt which read 92%, which is the reported amount of Black women who supported Kamala Harris for President. We have seen this before: our people are not counted, disrespected or excluded in the decision making policies that benefit them but not us. There are boycotts planned via social media and Connie Marks is encouraging our people to Buy Black. She voiced that churches need to be more involved. Our culture has changed tremendously since the 1950s when 90% of Blacks attended church, which was the center of social and spiritual activities. Today less people are attending church down to 48% by Blacks. Blacks are known to have higher attendance rates than other people. Today, the internet can get the word out in an email blast or posting on social media platforms within seconds or minutes versus the 1950s evening news, radio clues or snail mail which is mailing a letter. The good news is God is the same Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow. We must exercise our Faith and Pray. Our God is Lord of Lords and King of Kings

New Bethel continued the tradition of wearing African or African American Attire on the 4th Sunday. Ashley Smith's liturgical dancers performed beautifully and the congregation sang the Black National Anthem "Lift Every Voice and Sing." In the Spirit of our ancestors we also sang "We Shall Overcome" linking our arms together in the tradition of the civil right activists of yesterday.

Former Vice President K.Harris said, "We need to Organize, Strategize, Educate, and Advocate."




Spring Break and Bible Bowl
